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<u>Address by Professor Mark Bray, on the Occasion of the 2003-04 Speech Day of Sir Ellis Kadoorie Secondary School (West Kowloon)</u>

Mr Tse, teachers, members of the Management Committee, guests and students: I am delighted to be here today, and thank you sincerely for the invitation.

It is indeed a pleasure to hand out so many prizes; and to see that the prizes, in addition to those for academic achievement, include ones for sports, librarianship, monitoring, many other dimensions. Many students have received prizes. Others have not received prizes today, but will do so in the future. Yet others may not receive prizes during their careers in school; but even these

students will have developed in their own ways, and have much to be proud of.

A Speech Day is a special occasion to take stock. The principal has just done so with his Annual Report. Such events can become routine - especially for the teachers, whose lives are busy and find that a year goes so fast. But perhaps students may see the events differently - especially growing adolescents who are an inch or two taller each year, and so see the world from a different angle!

Different visiting speakers each year also see the world from different angles, and so can bring different messages. My angle is the University of Hong Kong (HKU) - a tertiary institution at the

next stage of the education system which is always glad to have applications from excellent students. I met some Sir Ellis Kadoorie Students at the last HKU Open Day, brought by Mr Tse. It was a pleasure to welcome them to our campus, and I trust that we shall have many ongoing links.

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I also have a research angle as I look at your school. For some years, I have conduced research on the international schools in Hong Kong. I am not sure how many of vou see Sir Ellis Kadoorie as an international school: but it is in fact important to include on the list, alongside such institutions as the Hong Kong International School, the English Schools Foundation (ESF) schools, Concordia, German-Swiss, etc.. Sir Ellis Kadoorie can be seen as a local-system international school within the public sector; and as such plays a very important role.

Part of that role is acting as a confluence of cultures, which is much to be treasured in our society. Adolescents are sometimes shy,

wanting to be the same rather than different. That is natural, and understandable. But multiculturalism is in fact something much to be valued, and in today's Speech Day I am especially impressed to see the performances in French, Urdu, Hindi and Chinese as well as English.

So, my message to you can be summarized as follows. Take the Speech Day as a time to take stock:

- For the students: Evaluate how much have you grown. How are you different from this time last year?
- For the teachers: Assess how the environment is changing, and how you are keeping up. Perhaps you have grown too but professionally, rather than in height!
- For the school: Treasure your long history and your multiculturalism. Be proud of the institution. The outside world feels that you are a special school, playing a distinctive and very important role in the Hong Kong education system.

I congratulate you all on adding another successful year to personal education and to your institutional history, and I wish you continuing success in the future!

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Visit by Mongkok Police



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Ramadan, the Muslim month of fasting and Eid by Mrs. Hussain

Muslims all over the world follow a religion called Islam which means peace, submission and obedience to God.

Islam is built on five pillars:

- 1. Faith in Allah and the Prophet hood of Hazrah Muhammad Mustafa S.W.A.;
- 2. Praying five times a day;
- 3. Fasting during the month of Ramadan;
- 4. Charity to less fortunate people; and

5. Hajor Pilgrimage to Mecca and Medina once during one's life

The month of Ramadan is the holiest of all months as the Holy Quran was revealed to the Prophet Mohammad S.W.A. during this month. Ever since the Prophet S.W.A. moved to Medina from Mecca, it has been obligatory for all Muslims to fast during the sacred month of Ramadan.

Fasting from dawn to dusk not only implies total refrain from food and drink but also from common evils such

as lying, bad mouthing, stealing. The idea is the need to learn self-control and also to realise the hardship and suffering of less fortunate people so that we can be helpful towards them and also thankful to God.

The month of Ramadan lasts for 29 or 30 days and culminates with special prayers and festivities. Ramadan is immediately followed by Id-ul-Fitr, which means the festival for breaking the fasts. It is an occasion of rejoicing and merriment for which we got a holiday on 15th November 2004.

<u>Diwali - Deepawali - Deepawali by Mr. Kumar</u> Festival of Lights

This is perhaps the most well-known of the Indian and Nepali festivals: It is celebrated throughout India and Nepal, as well as by Hindu communities throughout the world. Diwali symbolizes the victory of light over darkness and is also a festival of wealth and prosperity.

Homes around the world are lit with cheery earthen ware lamps (small oil lamps) called diyas and are placed around the home, in courtyards, verandahs, and gardens, as well as on roof-tops and outer walls to

welcome the Goddess Lakshmi and friends and family. Some families use a powdered, colored chalk or wood shavings to paint a Rangoli, vibrant designs on the threshold of each home.

The celebration of the festival is invariably accompanied by the exchange of sweets and the explosion of fireworks. As with other Indian festivals, Diwali signifies many different things to people across the country.

In northern India, Diwali celebrates Rama's homecoming, that is his return to Ayodhya after the defeat of Ravana and his coronation as king; in Gujarat, the festival honors Lakshmi, the Goddess

of wealth; and in Bengal, it is associated with the Goddess Kali. Everywhere, it signifies the renewal of life, and accordingly it is common to wear new



clothes on the day of the festival. Similarly, it heralds the approach of winter and the beginning of the sowing season.

The new accounting year begins with Diwali and the tradition is still followed by opening new accounting ledgers on this festive day and is also celebrated as New Year for
