


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Project Rapport

studying part-time, and worked up to the highest rank that non-Chinese police officers have had reached in the Police Force.



> class numbers were slowly announced and wished that they would be one of the lucky ones to get the 24 handsome gifts, courtesy of the School ECA Committee.




With the 3 grand lucky draw presents and grand prizes to the winning performing groups handed out, the Talent Show ended successfully


> able pool became the center of attention as many floating boats with candles were released, making the activity room much brighter and more festive!

> to the homes of friends and relatives thanking blessings.


